

What happens next after my targeted lung health check

Information for patients



What happens next

After attending your CT scan you can expect to be contacted with your results within 4-6 weeks. This will be by letter, email, or phone call. Your results will also be sent to your GP.

There are four possible result types

No problems found - This means we saw no signs of lung cancer or anything else needing clinical follow up on the scan. If still eligible, you can expect to be invited back for a repeat check in about two years time.

Second scan needed - This means there is something on the scan which we would like to monitor. Usually it will be harmless, but just to be sure we will check for any changes in about three months' time. It may disappear on the next scan or it may need to be checked again later. A small number will have changed in a way that further tests become advisable (see below). We will call you to discuss this.

Further test needed - This means we have seen something on the scan which needs further investigation. Additional tests might include a different type of scan or a biopsy. We will call you to discuss this and we will arrange for you to be seen at the hospital for follow up.

Something else - There is no sign of lung cancer but the scan has shown something else. Your letter will explain what was seen and recommend what you do next.

What is Lung Cancer: This is when abnormal cells divide in an uncontrolled way to form a tumour in the lung. When seen early on a scan it is usually quickly and easily treated with a good chance of a full recovery.

What are Lung Nodules: Commonly called a 'shadow on the lung', a nodule is a round area that is more dense than normal lung tissue. Lung nodules are usually caused by scar tissue, a healed infection that may never have made you sick, or an irritant in the air. About 95% of nodules are benign, meaning that they are not related to cancer and generally these do not cause any problems or symptoms.

What might "something else" be?

The two most common "other" findings are:

Coronary artery calcification: Atherosclerosis is where your arteries become narrowed, making it difficult for blood to flow through them. It increases your risk of heart attack and stroke

Emphysema: Emphysema is a progressive lung condition that makes gas exchange in your lungs difficult so causes shortness of breath. Smoking is the most common cause of emphysema. Stopping smoking will not reverse this damage but it will significantly slow down its progression.
