


## MRI Scans in NF2 Related Schwannomatosis (NF2) for Patients with Implants

**Information for patients** 



# As part of the monitoring for NF2, it is important that we scan your head at least once a year, and your spine at least every three years.

An MRI scan uses strong magnetic fields to take detailed pictures of your head and spine. Patients are asked to remove any metal work (belts, jewellery etc.) before a scan. However, if you have a cochlear implant (CI) or an auditory brainstem implant (ABI), this means the procedure for scans is slightly different, because there is a magnet just under the skin in your head.

We are able to perform an MRI scan safely without removing the internal magnet by bandaging your head to support the implant.

### **Head bandaging**

In order to complete an MRI scan safely with the magnet in place, a plastic card is applied over the magnet which is kept in place by a pressure bandage. The bandage can feel tight but should not be too uncomfortable and will be removed straight after the scan. The NF2 Nurses will carry out this procedure for you.



#### **Pain relief**

The scan is generally very well tolerated. Some patients may experience discomfort during the scanning and Paracetamol can be taken beforehand. Some patients have found the scan particularly uncomfortable and an injection of local anaesthetic around the implant may be needed.
